Without policies to ensure financial support for Roma students, many families in my community can't afford higher education. Luckily, I was able to get a scholarship from a foundation.

I met a Roma volunteer at my village's community center. The volunteer helped me stay motivated and inspired me to help other young students in my community. I didn't know it, but I was building a community of support and learning resilience.

efore I was born, my parents learned about a free prenatal program in their community. It was a powerful opportunity for them to learn more about responsive parenting and how they could best support me after birth.
