I will share notable moments in my life – exploring the events that made me strong and introducing you to the individuals who supported me throughout the many challenges I faced on my journey. I am proud to be Roma, of who I am now, and of my dream to grow.



Currently, I am a nurse in a hospital. I am also a new mother.



At the age of 22, I graduated from the Medical University in Sofia with a bachelor's degree in Nursing. I was the first person in my family to graduate from university. I received a scholarship from the Roma Education Fund (REF), which helped me through my studies.

During my time in university, I also volunteered in the largest Roma community in Sofia.

65% of young roma are not in education, employment, or training, compared with 19% of general population As a teenager, I attended a professional high school. I was the only Roma student in my class. My family moved from my home village to a city nearby so I could receive a quality high school education. My parents found jobs there to support my siblings and me in our studies.



y primary school was small, and my classmates were predominately Roma children.

I was lucky enough to receive exceptional support from the teachers during my first years of school. One of my teachers recognized my potential and worked with me outside of regular class times. She told me about the financial support provided to students by the Roma Education Fund.



During my childhood, I dreamed of becoming a nurse with a white apron. I wanted to help people in my small village. My aunt, a nurse, inspired me. She had a significant impact on me from a young age.

CURRENTLY, THERE ARE TWO PILOT VISITING PROGRAMS IN BULGARIA INITIATED BY UNICEF AND TRUST FOR SOCIAL ACHIEVEMENT FOUNDATION (TSA). THE NURSE FAMILY PARTNERSHIP **PROGRAM, IMPLEMENTED BY** TSA, IS TARGETING HOME VISITING SERVICES FOR DISADVANTAGED FIRST-TIME MOTHERS FROM PREGNANCY THROUGH THE CHILD'S SECOND YEAR. BOTH PROGRAMS AIM TO BE ADOPTED AS A GOVERN-MENTAL POLICY.

Before I was born, my parents did not have access to prenatal services. They sought advice from older community members.

When I was a baby, there were no home visiting programs. My parents were mainly supported by my aunt, a nurse, who helped them provide my siblings and me with nurturing care.
